## Submission for proposal for the Extension of the Tram Route

### 1. City Mall Pedestrian Mall Special Order

We support allowing Trams to be an approved vehicle in the City Mall and for this approval for Trams to be allowed at all times.

## 2. Laying of Tram Tracks in City Mall

We fully support the Council in laying tram tracks in the service lane during the current City Mall reconstruction. We believe extending the tram to include the City Mall is a vital part of rejuvenating the Central City Mall area. It would be a waste of money to come back to the City Mall in a year or two and have to lift the tiles in the service lane, lay tram tracks and then relay tiles around them. The businesses in the City Mall will suffer financially while the current reconstruction is done and to then re-open construction a year or two later to lay tram tracks would have serious negative implications on businesses in City Mall. If the Tram is deemed good to go through City Mall then all road works should be done in one hit.

## 3. Why We Strongly Support the Tram Extension into City Mall

At present tourists on average spend one and a half days in Christchurch and often take the Tram as a way of getting an overview of what is on offer in Central Christchurch. Tourist guides do not normally take their groups south of Cathedral Square as shops in City Mall do not pay commission on sales to tour guides as happens with a good number of the "tourist type" shops north of Cathedral Square. This means a large number of tourists never get to see the main local shopping, café and entertainment areas of the central city. They leave Christchurch believing there is a very limited range of shops and restaurants. This is not good for the development of Christchurch as a tourist destination as visitors are our best ambassadors.

# A: Tram through City Mall

I support including the Tram as an allowed vehicle in the City Mall under the City Mall Pedestrian Special Order.

I support allowing the tram in the City Mall at any time seven days a week.

# **B:** Laying Tram Tracks

I support the laying of Tram Tracks during the current reconstruction of the City Mall as prudent to save money as against coming back later to lay them and also to minimise disruption to businesses already being negatively affected by the actual reconstruction process of the City Mall redevelopment.

## C: Tram Route
