Essential projects: Tree renewal \$17.2 million. This figure seems excessive. Is this really needed, and will it really cost this much?

Proposals to Save Money: Page 8.

LIBRARIES:

Proposal to close Redwood, Bishopdale and Spreydon libraries: These libraries must not close! The proposed savings are minimal, and these are important community assets.

On Page 7 you say Council priorities include promoting

- Increased involvement in lifelong learning
- Encouraging healthy and active lifestyles
- Balancing the needs of people and the environment.

Retaining the suburban libraries is essential for learning, an active mind, and meeting the needs of the people in their environment where they can walk to the local library, particularly the elderly, disabled, and mothers with young children.

CITY SCENE:

Reducing the number of issues is a good idea; maybe even down to 6 issues a year, saving even more money.

RAISING PARKING CHARGES IN THE INNER CITY:

If you want more people in the central city, then increasing parking costs is a dumb thing to do.

Your proposals here are very vague, and the central city issue seems to go round in circles. The fact is that Christchurch has many great suburban malls with the advantages of being covered (therefore all weather), and having free parking. You say you want more people in the central city, but increase bus fares, parking charges, and central city rates, thus driving the locals away. Tourists are there, the festivals are great, and if the city is humming then no budget is needed for marketing – the people will come. How to get it humming? I don't know, but it needs a cohesive and long-term plan.

You say we want safe, easy and comfortable access to homes, shops, businesses and recreational and leisure destinations.

SAFETY:

In recent times the council has pursued the UNSAFE practice of **road narrowing**. To turn a two-way road into a one-way slalom course causing conflicting traffic flow is insane, unsafe, and I suspect – illegal. (e.g. Hanrahan Street, Riccarton and Fairview Street, Cashmere.) If kerb build outs are constructed to slow traffic entering a side street, then it is essential that a slow lane is created for the turning traffic, or else a very unsafe situation develops on the feeder road. Narrowed roads full of build-outs and humps make access for emergency vehicles such as fire engines and ambulances almost impossible.

Cycle lanes are one of the most unsafe practices on our roads, giving the cyclist a false sense of security. Cars constantly have to traverse the cycle lanes for parking, at intersections, and turning into private or business car parks. Is it possible to design a 'spider web' network of OFF-road cycle lanes? This would give our cyclists ease of travel, safety, incentive and speed, and I am sure would dramatically increase cycle use.

Congestion: Congestion is rapidly reaching unacceptable levels, especially on the four main corridors into the city. Solutions need to be planned and implemented sooner rather than later. Delays only increase cost. I have always avoided Riccarton Road if possible and used Blenheim Road instead. Now with increasing businesses and traffic lights on Blenheim Road, it too is getting difficult and slow. This is a prime example of flow-on effect of decision making without due regard to the holistic view. With Blenheim Road now at a crawl at peak times, (especially the Curletts Road intersection), the need for the southern motorway extension is very urgent. I was dismayed to see it suggested recently that this should be delayed. Delays only increase costs.

Conflicting messages are constantly given. We are told to take the bus, and then told to get off the bus at peak times. We are told to come to the city, then bus fares and city parking costs increase. We are told to increase bus patronage, and then told the bus exchange can't cope. Traffic management needs to be planned with the whole picture in view, and the following things in mind.

Cars are here to stay – get real and accept it. Our bus system is good and getting better, but there are many times and situations when they just don't suit. When I take my car out I plan as many messages as possible in one trip, and no bus route can suit the million individual needs of our citizens. New subdivisions and infill housing increase traffic on our roads. That is a fact. It needs to be planned for and roading provision made. Saying 'everyone should take the bus' is unrealistic.

Buses – priority measures are essential for people to become regular bus users, particularly at peak times. Three corridors are being considered for priority – Riccarton Road should be included also. I used to use the bus more when the 4-hour return ticket was available.
