Proposed Closure of Edgeware Pool

Introduction

I wish to register my objection to the proposed closure of the Edgeware Swimming Pool.

Background

For the last two summers I have taken my now six-year-old son to swimming lessons run by the St Albans Swimming Club and held at Edgeware Pool.

We have attended these lessons four nights per week for the last two summer seasons.

Why we love Edgeware Pool

The Edgeware Pool has been the perfect venue for these lessons for the following reasons:

- The lessons are friendly, fun, affordable (\$45 per season), and very successful because of their regularity – attending lessons four nights per week provides a great opportunity to practise and reinforce the skills learned from previous lessons, thus allowing the children to learn to swim much more quickly than via conventional weekly lessons at the large indoor pools in other suburbs.
- The pool is a local facility, therefore close to our homes and quick to get to after school/work. There are no traffic delays (lessons begin at 5.30 pm) and little fuel, if any, is required to get there.
- The swimming club is very well supported by members of the local community (with lessons even more popular last season than the previous one to the extent that the junior classes were full).
- The pool is outdoors, therefore the surrounding air is fresh and free of the unpleasant smell of chlorine. Parents and caregivers can sit in the sunshine in a pleasant green and tree-surrounded environment to watch the lessons.
- The pool is heated so it is a comfortable temperature for the children, regardless of the weather.
- The pool caters for a wide range of needs, from a shallow end suitable for beginners to a deep end suitable for diving (unlike the local primary school pool).
- The members of the swimming club are predominantly from the local community and most of the younger children attend St Albans Primary School. Seeing each other outside the school environment forges a special bond between these children who are of a wide age range, from different classes and would not otherwise get the opportunity to mix together.

Why we love Edgeware Pool, continued

- Swimming lessons provide an excellent opportunity for parents and care
 givers to socialise on a regular basis, thus strengthening the sense of
 community facilitated by the pool. I myself have made several good
 friendships as a result, and which would not have been made otherwise.
- The loud and cheery encouragement and support given by the onlookers whenever a young child conquers a fear, eg, dives off the dive board for the first time, is amazing and very special to the pool and its community.
- Active participation in the local swimming club (eg, as a committee member, coach, etc) provides an opportunity for local residents to make a positive contribution to the local community.

Other users of Edgeware Pool

Outside of the swimming club, whenever we have gone to the pool during public hours, it has been very well supported by local swimmers and families. Children are certain to meet up with friends from school whenever they go for a swim during the summer season. And parents are certain to meet up with other parents they know.

In addition, the pool is also used by the senior children from St Albans School for school swimming lessons. The pool is close to the school and therefore quick to get to and from during the school day.

Contribution to the local community

We love having Edgeware Pool in our community. It a special resource that provides an irreplaceable service to local residents because it provides a well-used gathering place and thus helps forge a sense of community among these residents. Strong communities are becoming rare in modern urban centres, and thus are all the more valuable and worth fighting to retain.

I grew up in a small provincial town with a strong sense of local community. The Edgeware Pool provides the nearest thing to this kind of community spirit that I have encountered in this city.

No large new indoor pool facility outside our suburb can replace this community resource.
