Submission against the proposed closing of the Spreydon Library.

I offer these comments in support of the present Spreydon Library.

Location. Barringtons is now a focus for the people of Cashmere, Somerfield, Spreydon, Hoon Hay and Westmorland. It provides parking, Supermarket shopping, Postal Services, Warehouse, Banking, Books and More, TAB, a pharmacy and nearby Medical Centre. This is a logical place for a library to be sited.

Disadvantages of closing

(a) to the elderly

Demographers stress the growing proportion of elderly in the community. Their needs should have special consideration

- easy access to a library close to the shopping with the addition of large print books, talking books, DVDs and tapes.
- transport and the cost of transport would be a major problem if the library were to close. For many older people public transport is not practical. A walk of two or three blocks to catch a bus is beyond their physical ability. If they are no longer driving, a library visit to Halswell or South Library would involve two taxi trips and an extra cost.
- neither is contact with the outside world always available to the elderly through the internet, many of whom do not own or use a computer and for whom a computer is no substitute for a book.
- **(b) to young mothers** who would similarly be disadvantaged if the library were to close. Some do not have the use of a car during the daytime. A visit to the library, while shopping, is a recreational outing and educational for the children.

In the light of other expenditure planned by the Council, the cost of \$450 000 for the closing of the three suburban libraries is a relatively small saving for the loss of an excellent service currently meeting the needs of many of its citizens.

I ask that the Council reconsider the plan to close the Spreydon Library.
