

Criteria based on resource that is not provided via library budget. Friends will tell the library when they have money to distribute usually once a year. Applications are prioritised and submitted via the Libraries Manager. Committee makes decision. Library purchases. Friends are acknowledged on the piece of equipment.
- donating a lump sum payment for any new library opened
- keeping a database of gifts made
- providing a social connection for people to interact and discuss the value of reading, books and libraries at meetings and other activities

Contributing to the financial well-being of the Friends through:

- fundraising for specific projects or services eg. Books for babies, ESOL material. This can include making applications to trusts and other community-based funding
- developing a list of potential sponsors from the local businesses community who could benefit from being associated with the Friends
- exploring opportunities for sponsorship eg newsletter, specific events
- retaining a structured membership fee due each year at the end of March

Promoting and extending our membership through:


- looking at how current information on the Friends is displayed and promoted at each library and on the library's website

The History of the Corsair Club 1925 – 1994 (796.7506 SHE)

It was the largest morotcycle club in New Zealand with 350 members. The Christchurch Corsair Club was born in 1925 as a social group which got together for picnics, train trips and sports. The name came from Corsair Bay where the group met. The Railway Hall, in Carlisle Street, was Club HQ. The motorcycle club was formed in 1929. Ray Shearman's 40 years with the club contain memories of many bikes – a 1925 P-model Triumph 500cc to the vintage Power-Plus Indian he still rides occasionally.

The book is nine years of collaboration with Maurie Wear, who died last year, and Jack Brewer.

Congratulations Margaret Mahy

Pride, Joy, Delight, Applause on the winning of The Hans Christian Andersen Award. The Award which honours the author who has made a lasting contribution to children's literature globally. Tessa Duder, Mahy biographer and member of the literature foundation which nominated her for the award said "This is for a lifetime of achievement and a lasting contribution to world literature, with winners chosen from 60 countries. One mark of her success is that more than 10 of her books have been translated into at least 25 different languages." (*The Press*)

Margaret's first story was published in 1961 in The School Journal. But we know, now, that her first book was written when she was a seven year old. Her two novels, *The Haunting* and *The Changeover* won the prestigious British Carnegie Medal in 1982 and 1984. The range of her writing seems to be unlimited. Now, *Maddigan's Quest*, a family fantasy drama, which was screened recently on TV, has been sold to broadcasters in North America, Eastern Europe and the Middle East. Additionally it will be included in programmes in Israel, Lithuania and Bulgaria.

Press TV reviewer, Trevor Agnew, described the matching of *Maddigan's Quest*, by Margaret Mahy, with a BBC quartet of plays inspired by Shakespeare as a 'magical pairing'. Does she have magic in her veins? Her appeal is wide, as the many translations of her work attest. Now the little Nobel as the Hans Christina Andersen Award is known, honours her too. By the former City Library, corner Hereford Street/Cambridge Terrace, where she was a librarian, The Society of Authors has acknowledged her work with a plaque in The Writers' Walkway. It's a nice contrast that the big Nobel prize medal, awarded to Lord Rutherford, is a short distance away in the next block at the Arts Centre, in Rutherford's den.

The prize for winning this most outstanding award is a gold medal, a diploma and a trip to Beijing to accept the award. It would be wonderful if Margaret's return from Beijing could be marked here in Christchurch with something special. It is so easy to accept our living treasure with the ease of familiarity but Friends of the Libraries are so proud to show their affection and respect to the gentle wonder woman who continues to weave worlds of fantasy and fun.

Happy 70th birthday Margaret. May we share many more years with you and your stories.

We look forward to hearing from Bill Nagelkerke who was one of the jurors who chose Margaret for this special award.

Friends of Christchurch City Libraries, PO Box 1466, Christchurch

The Christchurch City Council's Draft Long Term Community Plan 2006-16 included the possibility of the libraries at Bishopdale, Redwood and Spreydon being closed and the loss of the Mobile library. This has been of major dismay and concern to your Friends Committee and the wider community.

At the March meeting, Mr Bruce Tulloch addressed the committee. He was asking for support for a campaign he had initiated for **Save Our Libraries**. A committee had been formed and a petition had already realised more than 6000 signatures. Demonstrations at Redwood and Bishopdale had been well publicised in the press. Friends were asked to combine with 'Save Our Libraries' at a public protest planned for the following Saturday, 1st April in Cathedral Square at 10.30am. Your committee agreed to assist. Two hundred dollars were allocated for a media campaign on Community Access Radio Plains FM 96.9 with a further \$100 to assist with postage. Barbara and Daphne joined the protest in the square.

Plains FM 96.9 helped by obtaining sound equipment and their Community Programme Development Manager, Nicki Reece, gave very generous voluntary technical assistance.

Three city councillors, Sally Buck, Graham Condon and Norm Withers and Mike Wall, Chairman of Fendalton/Waimairi Community Board were present at the protest which was reported on National Radio and TV1.

One resident, on holiday in Tauranga, was so incensed when she heard news of the protest and its cause, she flew back to Christchurch to be part of it. Outrage at the possibility of library closures has gathered more than 9000 signatures on the petition. More people have indicated their intention to forward submissions – which must be received at Christchurch City Council by Friday 5 May.

A summary of the Draft Plan with a submission form on the back is available at public libraries.

A submission on behalf of the more than 300 Friends of the Libraries has been prepared and a request made to speak to it. Individual submissions on this – as well as other matters – are encouraged.

As Dr Ruth Zanker from the Broadcasting School at CPIT said where else but in a library can young minds be exposed to such a wonderful array of treasures leading to ever more. And more. Will our libraries encourage more generations of children to tell their own stories?

We are grateful to all the people who so willingly contributed their views on the value of libraries with Ron Kestrupp on Plains FM96.9.

Upper Riccarton Community and School Library

Te Kete Wānanga o Pūtaringamotu 71 Main South Road


In January the Christchurch City Council opened a joint use library in partnership with Riccarton High School. The library is the Upper Riccarton Community and School Library. Riccarton High School has use of the two class rooms, a computer suite and the entire library from 8.30 am - 4 pm Monday – Friday during school terms. The school's library collection was combined and is now available on the Libraries' catalogue for all. The community has full use of the library 9am – 8pm Monday – Friday and 10am – 4pm Saturday and Sunday. The library has a café which is currently open 9.00am–5.00pm Monday – Friday and a community meeting room which is available to hire.

We have had a really great response from the community and school students with over 100 thousand people through the doors already - it's a busy place to be. The most common comment from customers so far has been how light the new building is. We have also had really positive feedback from the students and staff of the school about their new library and our staff have found it wonderful to have so many teenagers in the library enjoying the space.



The building, by Warren and Mahoney, has been designed to ensure energy efficiency. Large windows let in as much light as possible, which combined with low energy lighting systems on daylight sensors reduces energy demand. Automatic openers open windows to allow air flow naturally for most days of the year and automatic louvres on the front of the building track the sun, reducing overheating in summer while capturing useful heat in the winter. Rain water is collected on the roof and used for toilet flushing which helps to conserve water.
